

Remote Learning - Live Lessons: A Guide for Parents and Carers of Students in Year 11

How can students access their learning remotely?

During this current period of school closure, Year 11 students will be expected to join live lessons every time they have a timetabled lesson (with the exception of core PE and additional Maths/English Skills lessons).

How will students know when to join a live lesson?

Students will be invited to join a lesson via Google Meet or Zoom from home. Teachers will generate and share a link with students/classes in Google Classroom.

How will work be assessed?

Completed work needs to be uploaded into Google Classroom, and it will be marked by the class teacher (unless work has been set using an online platform like The Everlearner).

What is expected from students?

Students will be expected to participate as fully as possible in the remote learning process by completing work to the best of their ability and adhering to set deadlines.

Students will be expected to log into Google Classroom following their normal timetable at the start of each lesson, so they can participate in the live lesson.

Work completed must be uploaded into Google Classroom to enable the teachers to provide timely feedback.

If students require any additional support from their teacher, they should contact their class teacher using Google Classroom. Students should do this during the school (working) school day. Comments posted by students in Google Classroom must be linked to classwork and the student's learning. Google Classroom must not be used to post personal information or personal messages to teachers and students. Teachers will only respond to questions from students that are related to their learning.

When accessing live lessons from home, students should not share the Google Meets/Zoom links with anyone else. They should work in a family space (not their bedroom) and wear clothing appropriate for school. Students should have their camera turned on when they join the lesson and keep it switched on until the teacher has finished registering the students.

Students must follow the School's Behaviour for Learning Policy at all times and conduct themselves in the manner expected in the classroom setting at school.

Any inappropriate behaviour will result in the student being removed from the virtual lesson and the appropriate sanction will be applied.
